Food culture changes as time goes by and new foods are introduced. Many foods we enjoy today were unknown years ago. We take for granted that some things have always been around and how would we get along without them? Let's start with that staple of youth groups and one must admit, gatherings of any age – pizza. How many people can remember the first time they ate pizza? Several, probably. It it one of those dishes that have been around on the east coast [and of course] in Italy for long years. But there was almost no knowledge of such a delicacy here in Kansas until the Pizza Huts made their appearance in 1958. Other Italian dishes with a tomato sauce base were not generally known. These included lasagna and spaghetti. Tomatoes were used but not generally in these forms. Mediterranean influence is around. We enjoy hummus, flat bread, pita pockets, and olive oil. Spices such as oregano and basil are in every kitchen in recent years. One cannot forget the Mexican foods we love. Burritos, enchiladas are foods we also are learning to make at home as well as going to restaurants to find 'the real thing' of which there are many manifestations. Sandwiches as such were unknown. Meat, cheese and bread were eaten together European style but not between two pieces of bread. This was a novelty. Coca-cola was frowned upon possibly with good reason. In the early days of this popular drink there was actually cocaine in the drink. No wonder it was popular. After the drug was removed there were parents who still did not trust it and would not let their children drink it because 'it was habit-forming'. In summer you could not buy chocolate bars. Stores were not air-conditioned and the familiar Hershey bars simply got very soft in the heat. How good they tasted when the weather cooled and they appeared again on the shelf. Many of us like Chinese food but not very many people are not preparing them at home. But, oh, those Chinese buffets! We are slowly learning about Oriental seasonings and foods in general. There are probably more examples of changes in our diet – some to our detriment – and some benefit us. This could be a conversation starter around the dinner table.





BURNSITE KEY REGULATIONS

Materials brought to the burnsite shall be limited only to tree limbs, brush and other vegetation. Items not to be left at the burnsite include asphalt, rubber or tires, shingles, or anything containing nails or other metal, construction and demolition waste, lumber and plywood. No cardboard or plastic trash bags are to be left at the burnsite – all grass clippings and leaves need to be dumped out on the appropriate piles and the containers taken back with you. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment periodically does an inspection of the burnsite and could shut it down if they find any violations. Anyone found to be in violation shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$100.00. Please do your part to keep this facility free of illegal dumping and lock the gate after you are finished.
